## It's the Holidays! Company is Coming!

Pop Quiz: It's the holidays. Company is coming. When you anticipate guests coming over your home, do you:

- A) excitedly plan a menu because hospitality is your thing!
- B) freak out and then frantically clean because you are afraid for others to see how you really live
- C) hate having a messy house...not enough to actually clean it, but enough to give it a disgusted stare from the seat of your couch.
- D) do nothing special that you wouldn't do any other days.

It's the holidays. Company is coming.

I confess that I am a "sorta" on the "B" spectrum. I love how we "really live," but I still frantically clean to create the smoke and mirrors illusion that we live in an immaculate space where children always find the hamper for their dirty clothes, husbands know the difference between a dish towel and a hand towel, and our kitchen sink is free from dirty dishes.

But, the truth is, whether I am frantically scrubbing toilets or vacuuming under that part of the sofa that does not see the light of day, I go into some kind of preparation mode in anticipation of guests.

That is what the season of Advent is all about.

There is an entire season within in the church calendar that falls between Thanksgiving and Christmas. It is called Advent and begins four Sundays before December 25. If Christmas is Christ entering into our world, then Advent is all about the expectant waiting, hopeful anticipation, and cheerful preparation of Christ's in-breaking.

Advent is <u>not</u> stressing about Christmas, rushing to complete our Christmas shopping, or breathlessly racing toward the December 25 finishing line. Rather, Advent is a cozier time of intention to getting your home ready to welcome a special guest: Jesus, the one who we are waiting for. Jesus, the one who in the chaos of our lives promises peace, hope, joy, and love.

We mark the days in this anticipation by lighting the advent wreath, which has four candles—three blue (or purple) and one pink. While there are many traditions in the larger church as to what each of these candles mean, the pink

candle is known as Gaudete, which means "Rejoice! Don't Lose Heart! The time is so close you can taste it!" This season of Advent, we will explore each candle on the Advent wreath as "Peace," "Hope," "Joy," and "Love." These four themes are hefty and loaded concepts within the Bible that inform our understanding of God's in-breaking in our lives and how we live in this faith.

I often hear the frustrated lament of folks who desire less commercialism in Christmas and more "Christ" in Christmas. If we want to keep "Christ" in "Christmas," than we should

feed the hungry, clothe the naked, forgive the guilty, welcome the unwanted, care for the ill, and love our enemies. Perhaps these are the tasks of anticipation and cheerful preparation that we "busy" ourselves this Advent, instead of frantically cleaning our homes like it seems no one is actually living in them? We will begin this holy time of Advent in worship on December 2 by being intentional of these tasks. Each worship during Advent, we will:

- *Pray.* After you receive communion, there will be a healing minister to pray with and for you, if you choose. Additionally, all the prayers of the church will center on the weekly theme of "Peace," "Hope," "Joy," and "Love."
- Act. We will hear the story about "The Giving Manager," a new tradition to our family this year.

"Currently, I am a reader at the first service and I volunteer to clean the church. I have also served on Church Council and served as Council President. I have also served on numerous committees over the years."


## **Toddler & Child Safety**

The newborn is almost a year old now and into everything. Toddlers and young children need continued safety at home and in their world. Toddlers by nature are very curious; take a minute and get down on the floor, how does the world look from this angle? Below is a list of safety musts for every home with children.

#### Fire and Burn prevention:

- Install and maintain smoke detectors on every level of your home.
- Doors and windows should be free from heavy objects.
- Keep matches, lighters and flammables locked away.
- Plan and practice a fire escape plan with the family including the child.
- Keep portable heaters out of reach.
- Set water heater to no more than 120 degrees.
- Make the stove a kid's free zone. Do not leave your child in the kitchen unsupervised.



• Cover all electrical outlets.

#### **Choking and Suffocation:**

- Keep small objects out of reach (buttons, coins, marbles etc.). Hint if the object is small enough to fit through a toilet paper roll it presents a choking hazard.
- Do not allow young children to eat hard, small or round foods. Children should sit and eat quietly, chewing food completely.
- Make sure toys are age appropriate; no small pieces or removable parts.
- Do not allow child to play in poorly ventilated spaces (car trunks, dryers).
- Avoid clothing with drawstrings; do not dress with scarves, necklaces, etc.
- Do not allow small children to sleep on soft surfaces.

#### Fall prevention:

- Place all furniture away from stairs and windows.
- Install safety gates at all stairs.
- Keep play toys down low in easy to reach places.
- Install safety guards on windows and keep locked if closed
- Any child riding on wheels should have a helmet on at ALL times.
- Supervise children playing on playground equipment.
   Play surface should be covered with a material such as mulch or rubber materials.

#### **Poison Prevention:**

- Lock up all medications; up high and out of sight.
- Keep all cleaning and other products in their original containers and stored out of reach.
- Read labels on all chemicals and use correctly; Use products when child is not around.
- Use child resistant packages.
- Install carbon monoxide detectors.
- Never run or warm up a car in an attached garage.
- Install cabinets lock when necessary.

#### **Drowning prevention:**

- Keep toilet lid shut and use lock.
- Best practice is to keep bathroom doors shut at all times.
- Never leave a child in the bathtub attended; a child can drown in one inch of water.
- Empty all bathtubs, buckets, containers etc. immediately
- Install safety fencing around all pools and keep locked.
- Supervise all children when swimming; use life preservers for all water activities.
