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A Little Child Will Lead Them

It really stinks to be a kid who finds herself in the hospital with an illness...but, it stinks even more when you are kid who finds herself in the hospital with an illness *during Christmas*. That's what happened to Katelyn Rudolph several years ago. Katelyn suffers from cyclical vomiting, which means that at any time, she could have episodes of vomiting with no apparent cause. Dehydration and fatigue can set Katelyn's little body into a downfall.

On Christmas Day of that year, laying in the hospital and awaiting further consultation, one of the hospital care coordinators at the University of Maryland visited the Rudolph family and delivered a stuffed teddy bear to Katelyn. Although she was a small girl, she remembered that bear and how grateful she was to receive such an unlikely gift on Christmas at the hospital.

Fast forward to December 2018. The Holy Spirit put it in Katelyn's heart to

challenge our congregation to collect toys for other children who find themselves in the hospital. Her story moved our church in some pretty big ways—in just two short weeks, we collected over **561** toys. The Rudolph family, along with their grandparents Richard and Bea Sherrill, delivered 14 boxes and 3 bags of stuffed animals, games, tea sets, matchbox cars, and crafts. These gifts were also specialized to give to all ages, from infant to teenager. This was especially important, since such gifts are more focused to younger ages than tweens and teens.

Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these" (Matthew 19:14). I think Jesus was onto something. Jesus knows that children often are our greatest teachers in faith because they come to embrace faith with simple, childlike trust.

Childlike trust. It is a lost art.

I think we, as adults, tend to lose that as we grow up. Our ability to "listen" to the Holy Spirit gets dampened by our fast-paced and overcommitted schedules, our "set" ways of doing things, and those demeaning voices that seem to remind us how poorly we are navigating through life. Service, that is—putting someone else's needs in the front of your

mind—helps to see beyond our selves. We are born into this world to be a blessing to others. And, as Anne Frank said, "How wonderful it is that nobody need wait a single moment before starting to improve the world." We all have the capacity and capability in our DNA, even our youngest disciples like Katelyn.

I will always argue this point to anyone who says that "our children are the future leaders of our church." No. Our children are our leaders <u>today</u>. Our children help adults to realize that God can make im-

possibility, a possibility. Our children help remind adults to "get out of their own way," and—in childlike trust—to be a reckoning force of divine love in this world.

A little child will lead them, indeed. May we always be open to hearing those great teachers (packaged in small bodies) among us today.

Home Safety for Older Adults

Falls are a leading cause of injury and death in adults over the age of 65. Injuries directly impact the independence, mobility and quality of life in the elderly. Hip fractures result in hospitalization with only one half of the injured older adults returning home to live independently. Diminished mental abilities, impaired reflexes, sight and mobility contribute to the number of falls and injuries in the elderly's homes. Simple changes in the home and the manner in which tasks are accomplished can reduce the incident of falls by 50%. An older adult may neglect or refuse changes due to financial limitations, inability to recognize the need for help, unsure where to get help, or failure to admit advancing age. The following lists are safety considerations for every home:

- Smoke detectors and Carbon dioxide detectors
- Eliminate or soften sharp edges
- Grab bars in bathtub and next to toilet
- Raised toilet seat and shower stool
- Lights! 100 watt for reading/60 watt elsewhere.
- Use lights in hallways
- Remove tripping hazards- no throw rugs, slippery floor surfaces, furniture, clutter
- Use non-skid wax and cleaners, use extra caution with furniture polish
- Stairs should always be kept clear and have sturdy railing
- In the kitchen use two handled pots and avoid wearing loose clothing with long sleeves
- Keep items you need low and easy to reach, avoid stepstools

SHARING TABLE FUSILLI

1lb Fusilli (Little spindles, cork screw, spirals) cooked

- 2 Medium sized (28 oz) cans of tomatoes
- 2 Green peppers chopped fine
- 3 Onions chopped
- 2 Teaspoons of dry mustard
- 2 Teaspoons Worcestershire Sauce
- 1-1/2 lbs Grated Sharp Cheddar Cheese (Reserve some to sprinkle on top)
- 2 lbs Hamburger COOKED

Mix all ingredients in a large pot, divide among two medium aluminum baking pans. Sprinkle remaining cheese on top. Casseroles will be warmed on site the day of service. If you are unable to serve, but would like to provide a casserole, please cook in advance and make arrangements to drop off at church and place in the church refrigerator (Hailea is in the office on Tuesdays, Wednesday, and Thursdays). Let the Light Shine: Worship in the Season of Epiphany

The word "epiphany" is unfamiliar to many people. Still, the church celebrates an entire season as "the season of Epiphany." This season stretches from the day of Epiphany (January 6th) until Ash Wednesday.

This season celebrates "showing forth" of Christ to the world. It calls us to show Him to the world through our words, and especially through our actions.

Epiphany is the traditional day when the magi arrived at Bethlehem. By their arrival, Christ was shown forth not ONLY to the shepherds and the people of Bethlehem and Judea, but to all the worlds and peoples symbolically represented by these three kings. In other words, to all the earth. His light shown upon them, and, after honoring Him, they went back to their own people to proclaim (and, we hope live out) His gospel (see Luke 2:30-32) and share the light.

The season of Epiphany reminds us that we share the joyous task first given to the Magi—to let Christ's light shine in and through us into the whole world—to proclaim his love and mercy and fortitude and hope. Epiphany, and our worship in it, therefore calls the church (that is all of us) to consider questions such as these:

- What is God calling us to do?
- Who are our neighbors, and how can we best minister to them?
- Are we sharing God's love and light to all?
- Are we, like the Magi, willing to risk ourselves for Christ?
 (Thanks to C.M. Olsen in "The Wisdom of the Season" for these questions.)

As we worship and celebrate in Epiphany, let us hope that questions like these remain foremost in our lives as a church and within ourselves. May we pray that they will—that we may let the Light of Christ live in us, and go forth to all the world.


