April Fool's Day!

Do you know what

The Saturday before Easter Sunday last year, I was giddy. Easter 2018 fell on April Fool's Day and I was wild with creative excitement for preparation. I had snuck into the church to deposit "\$20 bills" (see picture) in every hymnal. I placed it in such a way that it looked like the corner of a real twenty was sticking out, but

when the folks grabbed the bill, they got a special message that "Jesus has risen! No joke!" I also told everyone that I had gotten up early Easter morning to bake a homemade batch of brownies, which were literally "brown Es" cut from construction paper (they were gluten and sugar free!). I opened the sermon with some *hilarious* jokes like "How do you make a tissue

dance?" (You put a little boogie in it!) and "What do you call cheese that isn't yours?" (Nacho cheese!).

I was in my glory. Not only do I appreciate a good practical joke, but Easter coinciding with April Fool's made for some good theology! At the crucifixion and those long three days following the death of Jesus when it seemed like hope had been lost, Death and the Devil must have thought that they had won. Imagine that first Easter when to everyone's surprise, the tomb was empty—God had played the ultimate joke (prank?) on Death and the Devil!

And, it wasn't too far of a stretch connecting Easter with April Fool's because there is a centuries-old Easter tradition in the church called, "Holy Humor Sunday" or "Bright Sunday." In the Eastern Orthodox, Catholic, and Protestant countries, the week following Easter Sunday was observed as "days of joy and laughter" with parties and picnics to celebrate Jesus' resurrection. Churchgoers and pastors played practical jokes on each other, drenched each other with water, told jokes, sang and danced. This custom was rooted in the musings of the very first church fathers (like Augustine, John Chrysostom and Gregory of Nyssa) in the 4th century—that God played a practical joke on the devil by raising Jesus from the dead. Risus paschalis, or "the Easter laugh" as the early theologians called it. More specifically, some theologians suggest the festival was inspired by the famous Easter midnight sermon in the late 300s by one of those church fathers who described a vision of Christ confronting the devil and laughing at him.

I just love this imagery! A laughing Christ!

I can only imagine the devil's pompous and self-congratulatory grin as Jesus' body was delivered to the tomb. Then, just as the devil had gotten used to the idea of a dead Savior and ruling the world (for the people would have nothing to save them from themselves) and then—on the third day—April Fool's! The tomb is empty! He is Risen!

What better way to capture how our "divine trickster" defeated

death and the grave than to spend extra time rallying around the good news of Jesus' resurrection. The idea behind Holy Humor Sunday following Easter is that the joy of Easter can hardly be contained in one day. The resurrection changes *everything* and is a continuous feast of intense happiness and spiritual joy. It is—as one pastor called it, "a chance to celebrate the joy of Easter in a fun way

after we've celebrated it in a glorious way."

So, here is what I am proposing this year: while Easter 2019 does not fall on April Fool's (it's April 21), let us spend extra time celebrating the resurrection by incorporating Holy Humor Sunday in the life of our church this year. Let's dedicate the week following Easter (Sunday, April 28) and pay homage to the joy-fest. I invite you to bring your best joke, wear silly hats, or even bring a fun (safe) practical joke! The worship leaders and I are already planning some holy mayhem: mixed up songs, playful prayers, and sermon skits, to name a few. Laughter will "interrupt" and fill our worship.

And, if this "ain't" your kind of thing and your first reaction is of resistance, may I give you these humble words of invitation: It might not be your "thing," but—as a Christian, it IS your theology...so revel in it. Take joy that God played the ultimate prank and that you are saved from sin and death.

Dancing in the joys of the resurrection, soon to come,



MOLST Medical Orders for Life – Sustaining Treatment

Effective January 2013, MOLST became the new transferable and durable medical form defining options for life sustaining treatments. The form is completed after conversations with your physician, family and other important individuals in your life (i.e. clergy). The completed form may be signed by a physician or nurse practitioner. The Maryland MOLST form consolidates information at all levels of care, standardizes language and definitions, outlines all treatment options and increases the likelihood that the patient's wishes are respected. Health care decisions are to be completed by patient and reflect

their wishes. An authorized decision maker, selected by the patient, may make decisions based on the understanding of the patients' goals and wishes. The health care decision worksheet includes questions about CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation), artificial ventilation, blood transfusions, hospital transfers, medical tests, antibiotics, fluids and nutrition, and dialysis. Maundy Thursday Dinner Church: Frequently Asked Questions

What is "dinner church?" Dinner church is a unique worship experience unlike traditional Sunday worship. In Jesus' time, people gathered in each other's home to worship, which often included a meal. Breaking bread together is holy—food (preparing, making, eating) is love shared in community. The church is also love shared in community, so it makes sense to put the two together!

What can I expect? Expect the unexpected! We worship while we eat and commune each other (e.g. give each other bread and wine/grape juice as Jesus did at The Last Supper). We sing, light candles, and pray for the world. The sermon is conversational and will create space to reflect on the message in conversation with those sitting around the table. We collect a free-will offering to help off-set the cost of the meal and to support the ministries within our church.

Do I need to RSVP? Yep...because we believe that it is such a tragedy to waste food when so many other people go hungry in our world. There is a sign-up sheet on our church website for each time that dinner church is offered. Our website is www.HolyCommunionFallston.org

Is dinner church appropriate for kids? Uh, yeah... especially because children have to eat and because children are some of our best theologians/"light bearers!" Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me for the kingdom of heaven is theirs." Children are hard-wired for faith and this experience helps to nurture that. Unlike traditional Sunday worship where children are ushered into their own age-appropriate learning setting (e.g. Sunday School), dinner church supports a sense of family because everyone is gathered around the dinner table for conversation about living life faithfully.

What can I do to help? Come. Invite someone. If you would like to do more, we are always looking for "host" families who plan and prepare the meal. Ideally, we like to have three host families for every dinner church. Planning and preparing is done on your own schedule and availability. Each host family will coordinate with the other host families and then cook the bulk of the meal in their own homes (since our church does not have a commercial kitchen). Food can be warmed on-site. If you are interested in becoming a host family, please contact Pastor Chasity Wiener at PastorChas@HolyCommunionFallston.org

What kind of menu can I expect? Sometimes it might be pasta or pizza; sometimes it might be meatloaf or a vegetar-

ian dish...and sometimes we might be grilling in our backyard at the Outdoor Worship area and making smores. We are a small church, not a fullservice restaurant, and the point is to create a "dinner table conversation" atmosphere!

But, if you have food sensitivities, we can give you some advance notice of what we are serving by contacting our host O The Heavy Days

families (see above, What can I do to help?"). If you have severe food allergies, we invite you to bring your own dinner—but still come for the conversation and experience. Lastly, we do offer gluten-free communion wafers if you have gluten sensitivities.
