

“Spiritual” but not Religious

A frequent, reoccurring conversation I have with folks out in the community after I invite them to our church, is this: “Oh, pastor. Thanks, but no thanks. I am spiritual; not religious.” *I am spiritual, but not religious.* What does that even mean, anyway? Is it even possible to be “spiritual, but not religious?”

When I probe a little more, the conversation usually lends itself to how the person doesn’t need to be part of an organized religion in order to be spiritual. That, because God is in all things, God can easily be worshipped in creation, like in the sunsets, or in the forest, or holy conversations on the sofa on Sunday morning instead of Sunday morning worship. And, yes: God is the God of sunsets and creation and intimate sofa conversations...

...but we also know that God put on flesh and appeared to humanity as Jesus; not as a sunset or a breeze in the wind, but as this person. And, in turn, we, Christians, claim that this same fleshy figure, in Jesus, is the very head of the church.

...so to claim God in the sunsets—or to be spiritual, but not religious—is, to me, severely lopsided because it dismisses how God truly works in the world: through the fleshy bodies of you and me—and, through this beautifully imperfect place that we call church. We usually don’t encounter God through the burning bush or pillar of clouds—we encounter God through imperfect people who God called us together (not through sheer happenstance, but through divine will)—people who we might not have otherwise encountered if it was left to our own design—and then, called us, “church.” People who will challenge you, affirm you; people who will let you down, but also will lift you up and heal you. And, yes, even the pastor too: the very first thing I tell my new members is that I WILL disappoint you. One day, I WILL say the wrong thing or I WILL not meet all your expectations. I am not going to preach my best sermon each and every week. It is bound to happen. But, I hope that they stay around to see how God comes among his people, fills in those broken cracks with grace, love, and mercy...

...in spite and despite me...and you.

You just don’t get that in sunsets, in nature, or in private conversations in solitude.

And, God accomplishes this—in spite and despite us—by equipping all God’s people with spiritual gifts to use, specifically in community with one another. I think we really miss the mark when “spirituality” becomes something so nebulous and private that it can only be seen as a comforting and comfortable force field, that never challenges us (or that spirituality is something that WE tap into instead of IT tapping into us).

If you can, **read 1 Corinthians 12.1-11 right now.** This text ties “spirituality” down to very concrete things: the gift of the Holy Spirit, and our relationship with God and—specifically—to the church, because God never intended for spirituality to be private.

Paul wrote the church at Corinth because there was an issue of how they perceive spirituality. The Christian congregation in Corinth is often lifted up as a prime example of the remarkable diversity that could be found in the early church. Worshipping together were Greeks and Jews, slaves and free, rich and poor, united only by their shared confession that Jesus—who had come to earth in fleshy form, who lived, ministered, taught and then suffered, died, buried and resurrected—was indeed the God Immanuel, that is, “God with us,” the savior. They shared the confession that this Jesus, changed everything! A new way, that God had not done through nature like burning bushes or pillars of clouds.

But alas, human sin always creeps and seeks to contaminate what God has deemed good. They boasted at their gifts and—over time—had forgotten that they were only

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benefactors of their spiritual gifts and not the creators (or cause) of them. And, when the dust had cleared, there was animosity, there was hurt, there were serious cases of inferiority complexes and superiority complexes. Sadly, some folks at the church of Corinth even shrunk back, thinking that their smaller gifts were insignificant or unneeded.

Spirituality is indeed messy. And so is religion. Because being in community with people who you did not chose, is never easy. It is always easier to be a spiritual recluse, because if you worship the God in sunsets, the sun always rises to the occasion of each morning so faithfully, and not all people are as faithful.

...but there is beauty in these cracks of imperfection, for every person who we encounter is either a blessing or a lesson or sometimes both. Being “spiritual but not religious” is a slightly problematic, because, we are of course, embodied creatures who are divinely hard-wired for community...a community (church!) that provides the very place for people to BE spiritual. *Religion*, by the very nature of the word itself, comes from the Latin *re-ligare* which means to re-link or re-ligament (from which we get our English word *ligament*). That is, religion is what gives our spirituality flesh and sinews and what affixes spirituality to muscles in order to move, grow, and serve.

It's as if this life of faith is a big mosaic and each of us have a piece but the only way to see the fullness of God is to bring those pieces God has entrusted to each of us together and then to stand with one another looking at the beauty of it and say, *The gifts of God, for the people of God.*

The Junior Apprenticeship

The Junior Apprenticeship is geared toward building leadership skills and work experience for students ages 14-16, especially at a time in their lives when they are too young to get a job and are often too old for summer camps. This experience would enhance team building skills, while gaining work experience in a safe and supportive setting that gives grace!

Expectations:

- Students would be expected to dedicate one day a week in the church office, preferably Mondays, from 9A-2P.
- Students are expected to dress for a business office setting and pack their lunch.
- Students will work in the front office while also being mentored by other members of the congregation, while reporting to the pastor.
- Each student will be expected to lead a project, of their own design and choosing, that will better our church community. The student will need to submit their ideas for approval, gain appropriate committee permissions (if applicable), and assemble a team within our church community to complete the project before August 19. It is expected that the student will be the Project Team Lead and will have all authority in the planning and executing process. It would, however, serve the student well to seek the input from their assembled team, as this is the overall objective of team building.
- While it is expected that the students hold weekly office hours, we also expect that students should be flexible to work on their project—at their own flexibility and planning—during the week to facilitate meetings, follow up on phone conversations, etc. We expect the total office time commitment to be 8-10 hours weekly, including five hours of office hours.
- Students will need to submit to a formal application process. A select committee will help to oversee this process.
- The first day will be Monday, June 24 and the last office day will be August 12, with their project completion by August 19.

At the end of the program, each student will be recognized for their work, which also includes a “launch” congregational party celebrating their accomplishments. Additionally, each student will receive, upon request, a letter of recommendation highlighting their skills strengths and growing areas.

Next Service Project for all ages: No-Sew Blankets for Vets

Help us say **THANK YOU** to our veterans, while providing a little comfort to them during their hospital visits and nursing home stays.

This project is for anyone...from 3—99! If you can tie a knot, you can bring warmth to someone!

We are partnering with Fallston United Methodist Church to provide personal blankets for veterans by Veteran's Day (11/11/19). Our community goal is to create 1111 blankets!

So, start watching for sales on patriotic fleece fabric!

Directions on how to create these blankets are as follows...



Tie-Knot No Sew Blanket Directions

- Start with 2 fleece fabrics (2 yards of each color) in patriotic colors
- Line up the two fabrics, right side OUT. Anti-pill solids are FUZZY on the right side.
- Trim the two pieces so that they are the same size.
- Using a piece of cardboard, trace and cut a 5 inch square from each of the four corners.
- Lay a yardstick across the fabric, 5 inches from the edge so that you know how far in to make your cuts or pin your fabrics together and cut to your pins.
- Cut fringe on all four sides of the blanket. Cut through both layers of fabric at the same time. Fringe pieces should be a little wider than the width of your finger. Cut in from the edge 5 inches. Leave your blanket laying flat on the surface, with all fringes lined up.
- Work from left to right around the blanket, tying in the same way you would a shoelace or a balloon, depending on the look you like best.

Yard Safety

With the arrival of spring out comes the mowers, trimmers, shovels and rakes. Safety is important around the yard.

Remember to dress for the job. Wear supportive closed toe shoes. Long sleeves and long pants are best. Find a pair of properly fitting gloves and don't forget hearing and eye protection. Use sunscreen every day, even when it is cloudy. Bug spray can help keep flying pests away. Always shower after using bug spray to remove chemicals from skin.

Gardening, pruning, mowing is hard work and stretching is recommended before beginning any job.

Know your tools. Read your owner's manuals.

Are they working properly? Do blades need to be replaced and/or sharpened? Are the cords on tools damaged? Tools and chemicals should always be properly stored and secured away from children and pets.



Do not operate your mower with small children and pets in the area. Never leave your mower unattended while running. Exercise caution when mowing hills and ditches. Weed whackers should be used for areas around gardens, sidewalks and trees. Always wear the right clothing and wear eye protection.

A day in the yard needs hydration. Every 30 minutes take a break with water.

What brought you to HCLC?

"I was ready to seek another Christian church after over a decade at a conservative Presbyterian church in Parkville. We use the word "justice" often in our prayers and hymns. What does it mean?

Many people confuse "justice" and revenge. "I want justice" for many really means "I want revenge."

This is not the Biblical meaning. Revenge is not our calling. As the prophet Micah shows us, our calling is to "do justice, love, and mercy and walk humbly with God" (Micah 6:8). Even our U.S. Declaration of Independence speaks of "liberty and justice for all."

So, "justice" is not revenge. It is not getting back at someone, or "an eye for an eye." Rather justice is "to forgive one another." It is to pray for and to do good even to those who hate us, or whom we hate or fear. This is truly justice.

"Justice" for the Christian is to follow Christ and to share God's beneficent love. The justice for which we pray and act is God's gift of love and hope and mercy to us and to all God's children. Justice is that power which makes us, and the whole earth, new. It is the very opposite of revenge.

I know some say, "Revenge is sweet." Ultimately though it is justice that is sweet and holy, while revenge is a diabolical poison.

We are called to be justice-doers for our own, as well as the world's sake.
