The Holy Spirit and What is it to Be the Church

I read a quote the other day that made me stop dead in my tracks: A disciple is someone who has moved from being a recipient of the church's mission to being responsible for the church's mission.

We are all disciples of Christ, so (after an honest moment of reflection) where do you think you fall? Recipient or responsible?

I ask this question—not to judge or shame—but that we collectively might realize that the greatest asset to our church is you. "Christ has no body now, but yours. No hands, no feet on earth, but yours. Yours are the eyes through which Christ looks compassion into the world. Yours are the feet with which Christ walks to do good. Yours are the hands with which Christ blesses the world." When Saint Teresa of Avila wrote these words, she was trying to bring about an uprising of compassion, while casting a mission of love within her community.

...because here is the secret: a church building cannot be Christ in this world because a building cannot be animated by the Holy Spirit.

But people can.

Yes, we are a culture overcommitted, sometimes to the point of exhaustion. Yes, it is always easier to take (e.g. be a recipient of mission) than to give (e.g. be responsible for mission) because what the church offers—messages of grace, love, mercy, and forgiveness—are *exactly* the balm we, ourselves, need for our tired souls. We think to ourselves: "I cannot possibly cannot 'do' one more thing."

And, in the loud clamor and competition of what fills this world, the celebration of Pentecost reminds us that the Holy Spirit can be that much louder. The Holy Spirit violently shakes us to awaken from the deep slumbers of ourselves and what consumes us. It is a weird story, actually—in the book of Acts, the Spirit came on the early church community gathered in one place, in the form of a strong wind that filled the house, and divided tongues of fire that rested on each of them (Acts 2:1-3). Amidst the wind and fire, the disciples are empowered to speak some 15 different language not their own, whereby *outsiders* of Parthians, Mesopotamians, and Cappadocians heard even the message

of God's love mission for the entire world (them!) in their mother tongue.

In other words, *theirs* were the tongue that told this good news of a love language that the outsiders needed to hear: one of inclusivity, love, welcome, and faith. That is the mission of God—to empower us to connect to others and "Reach Out to Share Christ's Love." In the season of Pentecost, we are animated by the Holy Spirit to be the hands, feet, body, and eyes of Christ.

...which means that we need to talk about mission, Church, while listening to how the Spirit is blowing and firing among us collectively. We have come along way in our 35 years of ministry in Harford County, but what is the spirit asking of you to reveal to our church so that we may be the hands, feet, body, and eyes of Christ?

...because a church building cannot be Christ in this world, because a building cannot be animated by the Holy Spirit.

But people can.

We ask that you—over the next 10-12 weeks, be open to catch glimpses of the real hands, feet, body, and eyes of Christ all around you...

...like in the ways that people support each other, in a time of national division...

- ...in the ways we can pull together to combat hunger or other social injustices in our world...
- ...in the passionate ways that we can better share these beautiful love stories of our faith, about a God who relentlessly rescues and finds the lost...
- ...in the ways that we can speak the languages of grace and love to those who are on the outsiders...

The Junior Apprenticeship

The Junior Apprenticeship is geared toward building leadership skills and work experience for students ages 14-16, especially at a time in their lives when they are too young to get a job and are often too old for summer camps. This experience would enhance team building skills, while gaining work experience in a safe and supportive setting that gives grace!

Expectations:

- Students would be expected to dedicate one day a week in the church office, preferably Mondays, from 9A-2P.
- Students are expected to dress for a business office setting and pack their lunch.
- Students will work in the front office while also being mentored by other members of the congregation, while reporting to the pastor.
- Each student will be expected to lead a project, of their own design and choosing, that will better our church community. The student will need to submit their ideas for approval, gain appropriate committee permissions (if applicable), and assemble a team within our church community to complete the project before August 19. It is expected that the student will be the Project Team Lead and will have all authority in the planning and executing process. It would, however, serve the student well to seek the input from their assembled team, as this is the overall objective of team building.
- While it is expected that the students hold weekly office hours, we also expect that students should be flexible to work on their project—at their own flexibility and planning—during the week to facilitate meetings, follow up on phone conversations, etc.
 We expect the total office time commitment to be 8 -10 hours weekly, including five hours of office hours.
- Students will need to submit to a formal application process. A select committee will help to oversee this process.
- The first day will be Monday, June 24 and the last office day will be August 12, with their project completion by August 19.

At the end of the program, each student will be recognized for their work, which also includes a "launch" congregational party celebrating their accomplishments. Additionally, each student will receive, upon request, a letter of recommendation highlighting their skills strengths and growing areas.

Next Service Project for all ages: No-Sew Blankets for Vets

Help us say **THANK YOU** to our veterans, while providing a little comfort to them during their hospital visits and nursing home stays.

This project is for anyone...from 3—99! If you can tie a knot, you can bring warmth the someone!

We are partnering with Fallston United Methodist Church to

provide personal blankets for veterans by Veteran's Day (11/11/19). Our community goal is to create 1111 blankets!

So, start watching for sales on patriotic fleece fabric!

Directions on how to create these blankets are as follows...



Tie-Knot No Sew Blanket Directions

- Start with 2 fleece fabrics (2 yards of each color) in patriotic colors
- Line up the two fabrics, right side OUT. Anti-pill solids are FUZZY on the right side.
- Trim the two pieces so that they are the same size.
- Using a piece of cardboard, trace and cut a 5 inch square from each of the four corners.
- Lay a yardstick across the fabric, 5 inches from the edge so that you know how far in to make your cuts or pin your fabrics together and cut to your pins.
- Cut fringe on all four sides of the blanket. Cut
 through both layers of fabric at the same time. Fringe
 pieces should be a little wider than the width of your
 finger. Cut in from the edge 5 inches. Leave your
 blanket laying flat on the surface, with all fringes lined
 up.
- Work from left to right around the blanket, tying in the same way you would a shoelace or a balloon, depending on the look you like best.

Summer Safety


It is summer! Get up, grab the sunscreen and fire up the grill. What can you do to keep your family safe this summer?

Swimming is the number one warm weather activity. Each summer thousands of people are involved in water related accidents resulting in injury and death. Remember you and your family should never swim alone, swim in supervised areas, and teach everyone how to swim. Never, ever jump into water head first. Young children and pools present special concerns. Pool should be alarmed and barriers in place. Children should always be supervised in pool area. Never swim or remain near water in an electric storm.

Sun safety is important to avoid sunburn and the potential for skin cancers. Avoid or limit sun exposure between the hours of 10 am and 4 pm. Use a

wide brim hat and wear sunglasses that are 99% UV protective. Apply sunscreen (minimum of SPF 15) 30 minutes before the sun or swimming; reapply every two hours. Sunscreen is important even on cloudy days.

What brought you to HCLC?



"Prayer upholds the world. Without it things would be very different." Martin Luther in Table Talk

Prayer is central to a Christian life. It is the center of Christian worship and the center of the entire church.

If we can begin to understand prayer in this humble way, we will realize that we are not God. We do not know what God wills or feels. We will develop a deeper understanding of prayer.

What we do is pray that we will come more into time with God's holy will, even if our understanding remains incomplete

So, let us pray in faith and in hope. The ways of God are often beyond us, but the love of God is always present and available to each and every one.
