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Churchwide Assembly Review

As I write this newsletter article, I send you greetings from the faraway lands of Milwaukee, which—in the indigenous language—means "Gathering Place." It continues to be a sacred, "gathering place" as over 900 voting members, interfaith partners, and international guests converge for the 2019 Churchwide Assembly. This is my first Churchwide Assembly, and I am grateful to you, dear Church, as you realize that my call to you locally includes also my service globally. Just being in this holy gathering place has renewed me thousands of times and I have been (literally) moved to tears in the great appreciation of what our ELCA is and the hope of what it can be, that is to come. It is transformative to see what the power of churches—from across this great nation—all coming together looks like and what we, Holy Communion Lutheran Church, are a part of. So, thank you for allowing me to see this personally.

There are many highlights from this week's convention and perhaps some of the news has already reached you. We did, after all, make national news, as well as local news, (yours truly appeared on the Wisconsin syndicate of ABC news, but I digress). Here are the "big three" highlights from this year's assembly:

- Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton was reelected for a second, six-year term on the first ballot.
- A declaration of apology to our siblings of A frican descent, which was received by the African Descent Lutheran Association, with thanks and a call for accountability and living into the words shared. This, dear church, was one of the most moving moments of the assembly. Here's the hard truth: our ELCA congregation is the second whitest denomination, coming in nearly last in a lack of diversity amongst members. This is theologically problematic, because it means that expressions of this very church are "inclusive." Then, the question becomes, "Are we, as a Church, intentionally or unintentionally contributing to the systemic realities of racism?" We must fight the knee-jerk reaction of, "Well, we welcome everyone!" For this question requires introspection, especially when Dylann Roof (an ELCA member who was raised in our very churches) premeditatively shot nine black church members of Mother Emanuel Church after they warmly welcomed him to Bible Study. It would be later learned that the white icons of Jesus that hang in

churches (spoiler alert: Jesus wasn't white) and being surrounded by white congregation, enhanced his white supremacist ideology. I invite you to see this moving Declaration of Apology at the 2019 Churchwide by clicking here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=QofnGzsZaas

The ELCA Church declares itself to be a sanctuary Church. What does this mean? Good question, because as a Church, we are left to discern what that means in our context. When I returned from Assembly worship, I had learned that Fox news aired a five-minute panel discussion on the Churchwide Assembly's decision. As a voting member at the Assembly, I can attest that this panel was strewed with misinformation, citing that the ELCA is encouraging its members to break (or ignore) immigration laws. This, however, is not the case and should be noted that, of the four Fox panelist, not one was from the ELCA, which would have been helpful in squashing any untruths. Here's what I can attest to: Right now in our culture, "sanctuary" is a word filled with politically charged rhetoric and—in those political circles— "shelter" word has come to mean specific things. As a voting member of the assembly, I can share with you that the assembly also debated extensively how "sanctuary" might be construed, both in legal and cultural contexts. In the end, however, the assembly reached consensus that by declaring the church body as "sanctuary" will mean that we intend to abide by the divine biblical mandate to care for the "foreigner among us," in other words, the person who is not like us. God's mandate is, as one of our assembly guest speakers—who was a rabbi—repeated 36 times in the Torah. 36, in the Jewish tradition, means life. That is no coincidence, as God is revealed in the

richness of community, which includes "the other." In the end, this means that we, as ELCA churches, can continue the work that so many among us already do, like extending hospitality to immigrants and immigrant communities, and press for the end of mass detentions and lift up immigrants' voices. Citing Bishop Eaton, "Our call to love our neighbor is central to our faith. In our baptismal covenant we promise to strive for peace and justice in all the world. One of the ways we live out this vow is through our commitment to welcoming the stranger. With this declaration, we publicly state that walking alongside refugees and immigrants is a matter of faith." To repeat: as a church, we are left to discern what "sanctuary" means in our context. There is wisdom there, especially since border churches might wish to take action differently than those in the Northeast, for example. Some other congregations might choose to designate special funds and collect supplies as to their capabilities, while others may not do anything beyond their current work on lifting up the oppressed.

Finally, some other very notable highlights include:

- Approved support for the World Council of Church's "Thursdays in Black," an awareness movement for a world without rape and violence.
- Voted to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance, in honor and remembrance of the martyrdom of the Emanuel 9.
- Approved a declaration for inter-religious commitment, reaffirming ecumenical and interfaith partnerships.
- Approved the recommendations from a strategic task force which has been studying how to work toward authentic diversity in our church.
- Adopted a new social statement, "Faith, Sexism, and Justice: a Lutheran Call to Action," and its implementing resolutions. You can read the statement by visiting https://www.elca.org/womenandjustice
- Elected Deacon Sue Rothmeyer as Churchwide Secretary, a fulltime position which acts as executive administrator and leader on all constitutional matters and interpretation.
- Constitutional change for Deacons (rostered ministers of word and service) to be "ordained," from the previous practice of "consecration." Currently, there is language that divides clergy and deacons, when in fact, both tracks of ministry are called positions within the church. These constitutional change sought to lesson that divide.
- Celebrated the milestones of 50 years of women's ordination, 40 years since the first woman of color was ordained, and 10 years since full inclusion of LGBTQLA+ clergy.

American novelist, poet, and social activist, Alice Walker, once wrote: "Any God I ever felt in church, I brought in with me." I think the same was said among the 900+ voting members, as they "brought God with" them in the sacred "Gathering Space" of Milwaukee. And, People of God, it was incredibly holy to see the work that our denomination can do with near 3.5 million members together. Be proud that our little church, Holy Communion, is part of that narrative in the work that we do together!



Next Service Project for all ages: No-Sew Blankets for Vets

Help us say **THANK YOU** to our veterans, while providing a little comfort to them during their hospital visits and nursing home stays.

HCLC is hosting a Veteran Fleece Blanket Workshop! Please come to the fellowship hall either before you worship, after you worship, or both on Sunday, August 25th.

Directions on how to create these blankets are as follows...

<u>Tie-Knot No Sew Blanket Directions</u>

- Start with 2 fleece fabrics (2 yards of each color) in patriotic colors
- Line up the two fabrics, right side OUT. Anti-pill solids are FUZZY on the right side.
- Trim the two pieces so that they are the same size.
- Using a piece of cardboard, trace and cut a 5 inch square from each of the four corners.
- Lay a yardstick across the fabric, 5 inches from the edge so that you know how far in to make your cuts or pin your fabrics together and cut to your pins.
- Cut fringe on all four sides of the blanket. Cut
 through both layers of fabric at the same time.
 Fringe pieces should be a little wider than the width
 of your finger. Cut in from the edge 5 inches.
 Leave your blanket laying flat on the surface, with
 all fringes lined up.
- Work from left to right around the blanket, tying in the same way you would a shoelace or a balloon, depending on the look you like best.

The Priesthood of All Believers

"You are a Royal Priesthood." 1 Peter 2:9

Who are the priests here at Holy Communion ELCA?

As Protestants we say "Everyone is."

Since the days of the Reformation, Protestant Christians have embraced Luther's (and the Bible's) view of the priesthood as a calling given to all. (Some have even said that this is "Luther's greatest contribution to the church.")

By our baptism we have been made priests (I Peter 2:9) "Every Christian is someone else's priest and we are all priests to one another." (Luther again)

Each and every Christian can do the "job" of a priest to intercede before God for all people. Luther says, "We all can and will do this."

The fact that we are all priests also shows us that we are not Christians as "lone persons." We are all bound together, just as "one cake," baked by God. We care for one another.

To be a priest then means not just to be able to preach or baptize or serve at the Lord's table or to forgive sins, but to act lovingly toward one another and especially the poor, the weak, and the forgotten. <u>All</u> of us can do these things because of our priesthood, clergy and lay folks alike.

The clergy are called to do all of this on a regular basis, but so is everyone, if the situation requires it (as it VERY often does).

As priest of God in Christ we are not kings or queens or rulers or "special;" in any way. We are servant priests to all those around us.

The church is not a hierarchy. No one is above another. We are all "one cake." We are priests of God, one and all.
