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Did Adam and Eve Have Belly Buttons?

Have you ever noticed that when you see paintings depicting Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, they always have belly buttons? *Think about that for a moment.* As the first humans created by God (in <u>not</u> the conventional way that we know humans are created), why would they *need* belly buttons in the first place?

...or how about these ponderings?

- Why did God tempt Adam and Eve with the divine commandment not to eat from the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil?
- If God created the universe, who created God?
- If Adam and Eve where the first humans, how could their children possibly procreate? Wouldn't that be incest?

These are all *great* questions...I am just not sure we are asking the *right* questions when approaching the creation story.

Let's start from this framework: When you walk into a library, you will find two larger categories of books—fiction and non-fiction. From these two categories, sub-subjections (or genres) are further parsed out. In the non-fiction section you will find aisles of autobiographies, science texts, cook books, and Do-It-Yourself books. When you head to the fictional section, you will find mystery novels, sci-fi, poetry, and romance stories. What you may not be aware of is that you bring expectations to each genre-type you are seeking—you wouldn't expect a biography of George Washington to include stories of aliens from outer space, because it violates those boundaries of what is expected from a biography.

The Bible is similar—it is not "a" book, but a collection of books (66 to be exact). The Bible, itself, is a library that mixes genres: there are historical books that fit non-fictional timelines of early humanity; there are also legends, fables, and letters, too. So, to read any book in the bible is to first understand what genre it is so we know (and can put into "check") the expectations.

It is the same concept with the creation story in Genesis. It is legend. It is poetry. It is intended to evoke emotions to

move us to poems of praise for a God that can accomplish such a masterful feat. Every faith has its own creation story: and in the <u>two</u> creation stories we have in the Bible (Yes! Two: Genesis 1:1-2:3 and Genesis 2:4-25), these legends were told long ago, under the starry sky in the soft glows of a campfire. It was recited by one generation to another for centuries before it was written down.

It is in these great legends that we hear humanity's birth story and begin to understand our purpose: we are the crown jewel of God's creation, set in God's own image, to carry out the divine goodness in our world. We also learn a lot about us, in the book of Genesis, too: humans have a disposition to rebel. From the beginning, we have tried to break out of divine boundaries, in order to selfishly be independent from God. We learn a lot about God's character and how God responses to each time when we humans screw things up: God responds with love and grace (even in the floods; even when evicting Adam and Eve from the garden; even in the destruction of great cities, and even when sin takes its hold on us).

The Jews, who have lived with Genesis for a long time, are amazed that Christians want to literalize Genesis' poetry. The creation story will also invite more questions than it intends to answer. To ask about belly buttons or incestuous procreation from the offspring of Adam and Eve is to miss the essential point. Even to interpret the days as certain geological time frames, is to turn a faith statement into scientific text...and then we violate the boundaries of genre expectations.

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.....and so much more!

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The creation stories are poems, not historical accounts. Therefore, the symbol of God creating the world in seven days is actual a faith statement: it implies progressive creativity and careful order. More so, seven days are poetic symbols to remind us to order our lives as God has ordered the universe and that God CAN make order in the messy chaos of our own voids of darkness.

Here's a fun activity: Read another creation legend/poem called Skywoman to remove yourself from the familiarity of the creation stories that we already know. This story and versions of this story—have been told by indigenous people. When you have read Skywoman's creation story, what feelings did it evoke? What were some of the key points about how the world was created? What does this story tell us about sacrificial love and our interconnectedness with the world? After you have read it, then, realize that this story, too, was not intended to scientifically "prove" how humans came into being, but rather the beauty that surrounds our relationship with the divine and our world and the sacrificial love from creating this world. Be swept away in the poetic beauty of the creation story.

Vaccines Aren't Just For Kids

Vaccines are recommended at every age. The vaccines you need are determined by your age, lifestyle, travel and health history. Vaccines protect you and the individuals around you from serious illness and hospitalizations. The following is a list of vaccines for adults.

Influenza (flu) - This immunization is recommended each year

for everyone 6 months and older. This reduces the risk of the flu and potential serious complications. There are few complications from the vaccine and you cannot catch the flu from it.

Individuals with egg allergies, who are immune compromised and have a history of Gullain-Barre Syndrome should avoid the vaccine.

Shingles – The newest vaccine only around since 2006 protects individuals from the Herpes Zoster virus, the same virus responsible for chicken pox. The vaccine has reduced shingles cases the United States by 51%. Adults 60 years and older need the vaccine even if they have already had the shingles. Individuals allergic to gelatin, neomycin, pregnant, or with weakened immune system should avoid the vaccine.

Pneumococcal – individuals 65 years and older should have this vaccine. There are two vaccines PCV13 and PPSV23. The CDC recommends one dose of PCV13 first with PPSV23 at least one year later. Infections with this bacteria can lead to pneumonia, sepsis, meningitis and death.

Tetanus – a vaccine that is given once every 10 years. In 2006 the Tdap vaccine was introduced and provides protection for both tetanus and whooping cough infections. The CDC recommends all adults receive one dose of Tdap followed by Td every 10 years. In recent years there have been outbreaks of whooping cough in the United States.

MMR – anyone born later than 1958 should have their immunity assessed with a blood test and/or receive a MMR vaccine. This vaccine protects from measles, mumps and rubella. The number of reported Measles cases in United States is on the rise because children are not being immunized.

Hepatitis A & B – two viruses that infect the liver. The vaccine provides protection for a least 25 years. Hepatitis A vaccine is two injections given six months apart. Hepatitis B vaccine is three injections. Consult with your physician to see if you should have these vaccines.



Project, and we need your help putting them together! If you have any questions please contact Donna Campbell at 410-459-6321. If you can't

make it to the workshop, but would like to donate fleece or money to the project, it would be much appreciated!

Directions on how to create these blankets are as follows...

Tie-Knot No Sew Blanket

Directions

- Start with 2 fleece fabrics (2 yards of each color) in patriotic colors
- Line up the two fabrics, right side OUT. Anti-pill solids are FUZZY on the right side.
- Trim the two pieces so that they are the same size.
- Using a piece of cardboard, trace and cut a 5 inch square from each of the four corners.
- Lay a yardstick across the fabric, 5 inches from the edge so that you know how far in to make your cuts or pin your fabrics together and cut to your pins.
- Cut fringe on all four sides of the blanket. Cut
 through both layers of fabric at the same time.
 Fringe pieces should be a little wider than the width
 of your finger. Cut in from the edge 5 inches.
 Leave your blanket laying flat on the surface, with
 all fringes lined up.
- Work from left to right around the blanket, tying in the same way you would a shoelace or a balloon, depending on the look you like best.

Bus Tour

We planted 91 trees a few years ago and—just this year—was a community learning site for rain barrels and water conservation education. If you are helping to serve, then just report directly with the food to the Sharing Table at Prince of Peace Catholic Church in Edgewood (Willoughby Road). We warm all casseroles on site.

SHARING TABLE FUSILLI

1lb Fusilli (Little spindles, cork screw, spirals) cooked

- 2 Medium sized (28 oz) cans of tomatoes
- 2 Green peppers chopped fine
- 3 Onions chopped
- 2 Teaspoons of dry mustard
- 2 Teaspoons Worcestershire Sauce
- 1-1/2 lbs Grated Sharp Cheddar Cheese (Reserve some to sprinkle on top)
- 2 lbs Hamburger COOKED

Mix all ingredients in a large pot, divide among two medium aluminum baking pans. Sprinkle remaining cheese on top. Casseroles will be warmed on site the day of service. If you are unable to serve, but would like to provide a casserole, please cook in advance and make arrangements to drop off at church and place in the church refrigerator (Hailea is in the office on Tuesdays, Wednesday, and Thursdays). Often I have heard people say, "Why do we have an offering? All the church wants is my money. The heck with that."

Why do we have an offering? We have offerings, of course, to pay the bills. But, this is hardly the only reason. As the hymn quoted above tells us that we offer gifts to God <u>primarily</u> to give God thanks and praise for all God's gifts and mercies to us.

We give for at least these three reasons:

- At Holy Communion, we offer back to God the gifts of food and drink (bread and wine) which we have received from God's love and mercy: an offering of thanksgiving laid at God's glorious feet.
- We offer in order to pay the bills. Utilities, salaries, insurance, etc are not paid out of denominational funds or from others. They are paid for by us—out of the bounty that is ours from God.
- We offer not only money, but our very selves, our hearts and our souls. We bring these gifts to God. We give to God the offering of our prayers, our work, our very selves toward the ends of peace and fulfillment for all; for an end to hate and poverty and oppression and hunger and pollution and harm to others and to the earth itself. We have promised to do these things in the name and the Spirit of Christ, and God trusts us to do them.

We give ourselves as gifts to God and to a suffering, broken world.

Offering is both thanksgiving and promise. Radical generosity is our calling as followers of the Christ, who gives so much to us.
